I am excited to say that we are finally seeing a "light at the end of the tunnel" when it comes to the COVID-19 pandemic. Although Helen Woodward Animal Center has been open and extremely busy throughout the last year, we know so many businesses that were forced to shut the doors, lay off employees, and may not be able to reopen... including other animal organizations. We are proud to say that we brought over 3,700 orphaned pets into loving new homes this past year and helped organizations in need around the country, from Texas to Louisiana. We felt fortunate that because of wonderful friends like you we were able to continue our life-saving work.

Although our Critter Camp program never really slowed down we did see a significant drop in birthday parties and school outreach. We are happy to see that kids are excited to attend Critter Camp this summer and most of our programs are already full! We are following all the CDC guidelines and keeping the kids safe and healthy, while they have a great time learning about our animal ambassadors and socializing with their fellow animal lovers.

We have brought back at least 50% of our Therapeutic Riding students despite a number of unique challenges, including the nature of the clients' health issues and the close proximity of our staff and volunteers to support them in their riding. The students and the horses couldn't be happier to be together again and we look forward to a June show.

AniMeals Relief is going strong serving those in the community who have lost their jobs during this difficult time with pet food and through our partnership with Feeding San Diego, human food, as well. We have grown our regular AniMeals program and are now serving close to 800 pets that belong to San Diego's seniors, both those who are struggling with financial distress and those who are homebound due to health issues.

We never slowed down during the pandemic, in fact we took on new and exciting projects like our Emergency Rescue RV thanks to the Linda C. Scott Fund at the San Diego Foundation and the Lewyt Foundation. Not only did we complete its specially outfitted renovations to help us meet the needs of animals in disasters around the country but we sent nine employees to special disaster relief training, so we are ready to go when the next need arises.

In closing, I want to remind you that not only are you supporting the important work going on at Helen Woodward Animal Center but we are continuing to offer training to groups around the country and the world. In fact, during the pandemic we provided 2 virtual "Business of Saving Lives" conferences and I spoke at a special international conference on humane education. We are touching the future!

Thank you for making this critical work possible – we couldn't do it without you. We look forward to a much brighter year ahead for animals and people.

SHARING BEST PRACTICES TO SAVE MORE LIVES

As a leader in the world of animal welfare, Helen Woodward Animal Center continues to stay committed to sharing best practices with other shelters and rescues in an effort to cumulatively save more orphan pets.

In April 2020, Center staff jumped at the opportunity to host a day-long virtual Business of Saving Lives workshop aimed at providing vital resources at the height of the pandemic to struggling organizations. Workshop participants walked away with tangible advice, plans and hope amid that difficult time.

Now, one year later, Center staff have just completed another virtual Business of Saving Lives workshop, completely free of charge, as the country and world are on the brink of a full reopening.

Dozens of attendees from 24 states and as far as Puerto Rico, Canada, Mexico and even Kazakhstan joined the virtual seminar. Members of the SEN Foundation in Kazakhstan were particularly interested in hearing about how the Center has adjusted to continue providing Humane Education to children despite the pandemic. The organization is developing its own program for children to increase awareness about the fair treatment of animals in their

The virtual workshop also included topics like successful adoptions and protocols, fundraising and how to share your organization's stories in the media and online.

"It's incredible to be able to share what's worked for us during this difficult past year," explained Hella Tyler, Adoptions Director. "When we all work together, we can make a bigger impact on the lives of pets in need."






Murphy, Previously Louis, Adopted January 2021



THE BABIES ARE HERE!

Babies are blooming and arriving at Helen Woodward Animal Center by the bundles. Kitten Season is a time between March through late fall in San Diego, when kittens are plentiful and arrive by the handfuls at shelters.

Some newborns arrive with their moms, but many are orphaned. These fragile fuzzies are referred to as bottle babies. Without a mom, they depend entirely on Helen Woodward Animal Center staff and volunteers for their survival.

Recently, two bottle babies touched the hearts of Center staff. Princess and Pea were just days old when they were found in a gutter in the Long Beach area. Their mother had been hit by a car and had not survived. Without her, the clock was ticking for them.

Thanks to our rescue partner who rushed to their aid, Princess and Pea received a second chance at life at Helen Woodward Animal Center. The once malnourished newborns are now cuddly spunky kittens ready for their forever

homes.

From round-the-clock bottle feedings, constant weighs-ins and plenty of warm cuddle sessions, bottle baby foster volunteers save our most vulnerable babies.



It Takes a Village

The first thing that Cheryl Steinholt will tell you about caring for bottle babies is that "it's worth it." Right now, she's fostering three itty bitty kittens named Amethyst,

Sapphire and Garnet who arrived at the Center from LA County in mid-April. They are her first kitten bottle babies but she's no newcomer to the world of 2 a.m. bottle feedings.

"It's about helping these tiny babies live. They need us."

Cheryl has welcomed nine bottle-feeding litters of puppies into her home during her time as a Helen Woodward Animal Center foster volunteer.

"It's something I've always wanted to do," she explained. "It's about helping these tiny babies live. They need us."

It takes incredible patience, love and determination to care for the most fragile of orphans. While middle-of-the-night feedings are difficult, Cheryl says "It's a special time."

Bottle baby fosters give their all to the precious critters in their care while knowing that their babies will one day leave the nest.

"It's sad to see them go but it's my job. To see them be adopted is so rewarding because you know that you gave them a second chance."



Kitten Season in Full Swing

Helen Woodward Animal Center is in the midst of the first big wave of Kitten Season. With four additional rescue partners over this last year and counting, more kittens are expected to arrive at the Center in the coming months.

Due to San Diego's warm climate nearly year-round, Kitten Season here extends into late fall, meaning the work is never really done.

The Center's network of 750 foster volunteer families are integral in saving these beautiful orphan pets. Just last year, 3,099 orphan pets spent time in foster care before finding their forever homes.

Helen Woodward Animal Center provides foster volunteers with all of the supplies they need to care for the pets in their home. From towels, beds, crates, scales, formula, heating pads, pens, food and treats, the foster volunteer's focus can stay on making sure these precious pets stay happy and healthy.

ANIMEALS RELIEF CELEBRATES ONE-YEAR ANNIVERSARY WITH SPRINGTIME EXPERIENCE FOR FAMILIES IN NEED

Just over one year ago, COVID-19 suddenly shut down workplaces leaving loving pet owners throughout San Diego County unemployed and unable to provide basic nutrition for their four-legged companions. Immediately, Helen Woodward Animal Center activated an extension of its AniMeals program. The program, which typically provides food to the pets of homebound seniors, military veterans and those experiencing homelessness, wanted to ensure beloved dogs and cats were able to stay with their families facing economic burden caused by the pandemic. The new emergency assistance was dubbed AniMeals Relief and provided pet food, specified to each furry member of the family, in a weekly drive through distribution.

To date, the program has served more than 300,000 pet meals, as well as over 130,000 pounds of human food in partnership with Feeding San Diego.

To celebrate the incredible work done by Center staff, volunteers and the giving individuals who have made the program possible, the Center celebrated the one-year anniversary of AniMeals Relief by hosting a special event for those most affected by the pandemic.

On March 31, 70 families (including 118 kids) enjoyed a massive drive-through AniMeals Relief Spring Celebration featuring pet and people food distributions, gifts for kids, the Easter Bunny and individualized Easter baskets for each child. Additionally, the Pet Encounter Therapy Program provided unique animal encounters.

"This program has been incredibly important to us," explained Helen Woodward Animal Center AniMeals Supervisor Sarah Jilka. "Over the last year, we've seen first-hand how much need there is among our community and we've gotten to know the wonderful families who have received support from AniMeals Relief. We were so excited to add something truly special to their weekly distribution with this special celebration."

Helen Woodward Animal Center is incredibly grateful to Blue Buffalo, Feeding San Diego, Steve and Sharron MacDonald Family Foundation, Naturally Fresh, Barons Market and Kentucky and Derby for making this special drive-through event possible.

REPORTING FOR TRAINING -READY TO HELP

In mid-February, Helen Woodward Animal Center announced its newest program – The Emergency Response Unit and Rescue Team. Now, the Center is one step closer to providing hands-on animal assistance when disaster strikes.

Helen Woodward Animal Center's Rescue Team spent the first week of April training with Code 3 Associates, a nonprofit providing professional training to individuals and agencies involved in animal related emergency response.

The Center has taken an active role in aiding devastated shelters during emergency situations around the country since 2005 when Hurricane Katrina left multiple animal rescue facilities in trouble. During Hurricane Sandy and Hurricane Harvey, the Center once again provided life-saving assistance.

These rescue missions left their mark on Helen Woodward Animal Center.

Thanks to generous donors, the Linda C. Scott Fund for Animal Welfare and The San Diego Foundation's matching grant support of \$125,000, generously matched with another \$125,000 by the Alex and Elisabeth Lewyt Charitable Trust, the Center is now the owner of a state-of-the-art, 37-feet-long Rescue RV completely retrofitted with veterinary equipment and prepared to deploy to the rescue of animals in any part of the U.S.

The funding has also supported the readying of a Center Rescue Team complete with personal safety equipment, dry-suits, helmets, boots and more.



Most crucially, the funding allowed the Rescue Team to attend the specialized training in early April. The week-long course included instruction on water and boat operating safety, animal handling and behavior, fire awareness, search and rescue, navigation and more.

The goal of these rescue missions is to alleviate the burden on animal welfare professionals and shelters in areas affected by disasters when help is needed most. The Center's team will respond by rescuing and treating injured pets and transporting orphan animals in need back to San Diego to safety.
